Grogu Foundation Paper Piecing Pattern

This pattern was designed to be user friendly and is divided into blocks identified by letters (columns) and numbers (rows). Each block is sized to easily print on standard size printing paper. When complete, this quilt measures out to be 40”x52.5” but can be resized as desired.

A basic understanding of foundation paper piecing prior to starting this design is advised.

Fabric

This pattern does not specify exact fabrics or yardage. The reason for this is that the pattern has many options for how it can be used and therefore the amount of fabric needed or each color depends on how you decide to interpret the pattern. With that said, a quarter yard is enough for most colors used in this pattern, the background colors that are lighter may be closer to 1/2 yard.

Understanding the Blocks


Within each block, pieces are labeled in the order in which they are sewn and also describe the fabric required. Because numbers are used to represent grayscale, the order is indicated with letters (“A” first, “B” section etc.)

Sections in a Block: Some blocks are divided into multiple sections indicated by red lines. After each piece in a section is sewn, use a ruler to measure 1/4” from the seam and trim the excess fabric.

- Where there are red lines, which indicated a new section within a block, cut the block into pieces along the red lines and then sew those pieces back together in the same way it was connected prior to being cut. The order pieces should be sewn in are labeled on the blocks, (example: Section 1, Section 2). If the label says, “Section 1A, Section 1B,” that means these two sections must be sewn together before sewn to Section 2.
